SCHEDULE OF ADULT CLASSES

Other than for flower arranging, produce should be home grown, or from your allotment. Adult classes are charged at 75p per entry. Open to all, membership not required.

SECTION 1 - NOVICES

Entry to the novice class is open only to those who have not won a prize in any previous Petersham Summer Show.

- 1. One single bloom
- 2. One vase of flowers, mixed kinds
- 3. One dish of vegetables, one or more kinds
- 4 One house plant (floral or foliage)

SECTION 2 - FLOWERS

- 5. One rose (any colour) with own foliage
- Four roses, one or more varieties 6.
- One spike of flowers, one stem only
- One vase of pinks
- 10. Two vases of flowers, any two distinct kinds
- 11. One vase of herbaceous flowers.
- 12. One vase of Dahlias
- 13. One vase of ornamental grass(es) (Max height 80 cm)
- 14. One vase of mixed sweet peas, twelve stems
- 15. One vase of annuals
- 16. A spray of a shrub (other than roses) bearing fruit, flowers and/or foliage
- 17. One vase of mixed garden flowers

- 18. The most uncommon flower, named if possible
- One vase of miniature roses, three sprays 19. One hanging basket or one garden container planted for summer, not exceeding 38 cm (15") diameter.
 - 20. A floral pot plant, pot not to exceed 30 cm (12") diameter
 - 21. Two pots of cacti or succulents (pots not to exceed 15 cm (6") in diameter). (Note regulation 2)
 - 22. One zonal or regal pelargonium/ geranium grown in a pot not exceeding 15 cm (6") in diameter
 - 23. The Petersham Top Vase. See rules for submission in "Hints to Exhibitors".

SECTION 3 - FRUIT

- 24. Dish of red or white currants, five strings
- 25. Dish of blackcurrants, five strings
- 26. Dish of gooseberries, of one variety, ten fruits, with stalks
- 27. Dish of strawberries, fruits, with stalks
- 28. Dish of raspberries, ten fruits, with stalks
- 29. Dish of loganberries, ten fruits, with stalks
- 30. One dish of fruit, any one kind not specified in this section

SECTION 4 - VEGETABLES & PRODUCE

- 31. Dish of five potatoes, white of any shape
- 32. Dish of five potatoes, other than white, of any shape
- 33. Six pods of peas with stalks
- 34. Six pods of broad beans with stalks
- 35. Six pods of dwarf beans with stalks
- 46. A collection of herbs, three kinds in one container
- 47. Three clean hens' eggs
- 48. Small glass jar of home-produced compost
- 49. One dish of vegetables of a distinct kind not specified in this section

- 36. Three onions with full green tops (as grown, no weight limit)
- 37. Three beetroots, globe variety
- 38. Three carrots, long pointed

- 40. Nine shallots ("Pickling"; must be able to go through a 30 mm ring)
